

Dr. M. Threadcraft is an Assistant Professor in Criminal Justice at Jarvis Christian College and spearheads the "The Silent Room", an on-campus service learning collaboration addressing restorative justice, victim assistance and service learning collaborations within the school and neighboring communities. Dr. Threadcraft received a bachelor's degree from the University of Houston – Downtown (Sociology/Interdisciplinary Studies) and a masters from Prairie View A & M (Sociology). She later earned a doctor of philosophy (PhD) in Administration of Justice (Criminology) from Texas Southern University's Mickey Leland and Barbara Jordan School of Public Affairs. Remaining dedicated to the academy, Dr. Threadcraft expertise and interests lie in victim perspectives, policing and community interactions, race and ethnicity intersects in criminal justice, particularly in the areas of pretrial services and reentry and more recently, African American victimization.

Additionally, she has performed critical review for scholarly publications and presented findings and opinions at regional and national criminal justice professional conferences. Although she teaches criminal justice courses, Dr. Threadcraft previously coordinated and instructed Sociology courses at Jarvis Christian College as well as performed as a Criminal Justice professor at Texas Southern University, University of Houston Downtown as well as graduate instruction at Prairie View A & M University.

Currently, Dr. Threadcraft's community research and participant outreach focuses on identifying funding for victim services. She also looks to release a new book with Coventry Publication that addresses "Victimization in the African American Community".
